


ACT Branch President Report




The ACT nearly always has creators whose books are entered in the awards. Some are recognized as Notable books; some go on to be Shortlisted and we have had many that have been winners. For


February


April




CBCA ACT Branch Book Week Announcement




Member Survey

In November 2024 all members were invited to participate in a survey via a link distributed in eNews. The purpose of the survey was to provide members with an opportunity to voice their opinions and make suggestions about the events, networking opportunities and professional resources provided through CBCA ACT. The survey contained 27 questions, encompassing short paragraph answers, 1-5 likert scale, drop down menu selection and multiple response options.

15 members responded and their results of the survey were mostly very positive, however, a number of things were identified and have been incorporated into our 2025 calendar of events and services to be provided.

Some responses that are indicative of the general trend of the survey are shown below.



Schools, libraries, and literature more broadly are facing unprecedented challenges. To support you are there any resources, products, or supports that you feel should be a focus for CBCA ACT (14 responses)

- Discount at bookstores
- More events for students to be involved in even after school author workshops/talks or an author festival, PD events for teachers/TLs

- Updated lists of current local creators that could be approached to share their passion and talents willingly

Looking further into this through all the responses, some areas for further development were identified. To address this:,

- We have placed book chat sessions into the calendar for 2025 for those not involved in schools or who are retired.
- A list of local creatives is currently being researched, updated and will be shared with members via the website and through eNews.
- We have 4 local creatives confirmed as CBCA ambassadors for 2025 and they will be involved in various events.
- We have also added events and resources that will engage young readers beyond involvement in Reader's Cup and Shadow Judging. For example, 80th Birthday Book Adventure, 80th Passport linked to the ACT.
- Other online sessions will be made available for specific target audiences
- A Hello Club online tutorial session has been scheduled for early 2025 to address this identified need.



In Memoriam

Stephen Matthews

Wednesday, 2 October 2024 **taken from Books+Publishing** Publisher Stephen Matthews has died, aged 78.

Matthews founded the independent publisher Ginninderra Press in 1996 in Canberra, later moving to Adelaide. He <u>received an Order of Australia Medal (OAM)</u> for service to publishing in 2021 and a Centenary Medal for his 'contribution to the writing community and ongoing support for local authors' in 2003.

Ginninderra Press owner Debbie Lee writes:


I first met Stephen as a young publisher's representative, when he was the manager of the ANU Co-op. It was the heyday of publishing, when hardbacks preceded paperbacks, literary fiction and nonfiction titles were piled high, launches de rigueur and sales abounding.

As a bookseller, Stephen was discerning and erudite and as well-read as they come. Perhaps not surprising given his Cambridge University

education in the classics, moral science and philosophy. Stephen taught high school history both prior to emigrating to Australia and for some years upon his arrival. Subsequently, his joy in books radiated in the writing of reviews, author profiles and articles for the *Canberra Times* and the *Australian Book Review*, as well assessing manuscripts for large publishing houses, and judging literary competitions and awards.

As mainstream publishing began to contract, with acquisitions and mergers upsetting the status quo, Stephen somewhat counterintuitively saw an opportunity. In 1996, Ginninderra Press was born, with the express mission of publishing new and emerging authors, relative unknowns, writing in eclectic, not always fashionable genres, books that did not necessarily have a commercial orientation, but books that mattered, nonetheless. Traversing poetry, memoir, history, novella, anthology and nonfiction prose, the primary criteria—that these were titles in which Stephen believed.

Over the course of the next 28 years, taking in a move from Canberra to Port Adelaide in 2008, the milestones have been many. More than 3,000 titles have been published, and more than 300,000 books sold. Awards have rolled in and accolades ensued. In addition to publishing via traditional means, Stephen adopted print-on-demand, enabling global access for the Ginninderra Press list. He also lovingly compiled a series of chapbooks (20-page, stapled books of poetry) by hand, such was his dedication.



While many Ginninderra Press titles constitute meditations on the human condition, much of the list has been intentionally geared toward matters of social, cultural and political concern. In 2003, in response to the devastating Canberra fires, Stephen commissioned *How Did the Fire Know We Lived Here?* raising over \$73,000 for the cause. In March this year, Stephen's swansong, *Telling Australia's Truth*, comprised 120 poems by Ginninderra Press authors, expressing the shame, sadness and disbelief that was felt by many after the result of the Voice referendum.

In Rays of Light: Ginninderra Press—The First Twenty Years [edited by Joan Fenney], one contributing author referred to Ginninderra as 'a small but significant publisher of small but significant books. Stephen's wife, Brenda—herself a prolific poet—talks about the sense of community and of giving back or 'paying it forward'. In 2021, Stephen Matthews was officially recognised with an Order of Australia Medal for his service to publishing. His contribution to the writing community and support for local authors has indeed thrown 'little rays of light' across Australia. It is an honour and a privilege to be carrying Ginninderra Press forward and so his remarkable legacy may live on.

When Stephen was in Canberra, he was a huge supporter of the ACT Branch and produced many publications on Children's Literature.

Meredith Wright

Taken from Marion written by Karen Viggers

There were some sad losses in the ACT in 2024 in relation to the writing and bookselling community. Marion Halligan, John Stokes, Gemma Carey, and local much-loved, long-term Canberra bookseller, Meredith Wright who died of a rare cancer in late October.

I want to tell you a little about Meredith and pay tribute to her tremendous contribution to the Canberra book industry over many years. Even though I wasn't close to Meredith, I always felt warm and welcome in her presence. She was a wonderful, generous, cheery, positive and friendly person. Meredith came to Canberra in the 1980's to work at Collins at Woden Plaza, which was then one of the flagship Collins stores in all of Australia. She made the place shine and, during her time there, promoted a dizzying array of





books and authors including the huge Harry Potter launches. It was at Collins Woden that the book-buyers of Canberra came to know Meredith and appreciate her passion for selling them the perfect book. These customers followed Meredith loyally throughout her bookselling career.

Meredith took on her own beautiful bookshop, buying Dalton's in Civic from Margaret Dalton. That's when I first met her. I loved that shop – even though it was in a tricky position that wasn't easy to find. It had beautiful wooden panels, a lovely atmosphere, and was close to the ANU (where I was completing my PhD).

When my first novel was published, in 2008, I was clueless, and I had no idea what to do in terms of publicity and connecting with booksellers. But I did arrange to visit Meredith at Dalton's, and that was the first time we really spoke. She was so lovely and helpful.

Unfortunately, a perfect storm was developing in the book industry, with the Global Financial Crisis, Amazon and the Book Depository's predatory cost cutting, and the Borders/A&R market domination. Things became very tough for independent bookshops and Meredith had to close her shop. During that time, however, Meredith sold books at many community events across the local region. Always connecting with book buyers and making friends wherever she went.

After a short stint at the National Library Bookshop Meredith found her perfect bookselling position with Alison and Richard Kay at Dymocks Canberra City. It was here that she really found her people and consolidated her connections and friendships with many Canberra readers and authors. When Alison and Richard retired, and Dymocks City became a company store, the new management, for unfathomable reasons, didn't want to employ Meredith. She was devastated by this, but eventually settled happily among books at beautiful Paperchain, bookselling with her husband Steve Belton. For me, this is a nice circle, because Paperchain has a similar atmosphere of wood and warmth that I so loved about Dalton's.

Deb Stevens tells me that, over the many years during which Meredith sold books in Canberra, she was one of the lynchpins in the Canberra bookseller community. I imagine it was her supportive and friendly style that helped bond the booksellers together. She was also a champion for authors, and the connection she made with authors and their books made such a difference for both readers and writers when it came to selling books.

As a writer, I love to hang out in bookshops, and it always makes me laugh that I'm so bad at conversation in bookshops, because I can't stop looking at all the books around me. But I did still manage to become friends with Meredith while in her bookshop. For me, connecting with booksellers and developing friendships is one of the great joys in writing. I think it was the same for Meredith. I didn't get to see Meredith towards the end of her life, but Deb Stevens told me how, even when Meredith was in hospital and in serious decline, she continued to find joy in her family and friends. The end of life is a very sad time - it's hard to say goodbye to people we love, and yet Deb said this time with Meredith was a wonderful period of honouring friendships.

I will forever remember Meredith's sunny welcoming smile. She always had time to talk to people and make them feel special. She will be very sadly missed as a friend, colleague, fellow booklover and above all a passionate bookseller who loved people, books and community in equal measure. Meredith did not want a funeral and her family held a small party after she left us on October 30th. Meredith touched so many lives and now her friends, colleagues, customers and authors can farewell a much loved Canberra identity. We will share memories, stories, say lots or simply enjoy listening.

Meredith was the guest speaker at the 2022 CBCA ACT Branch AGM, she was a long-time support of CBCA and had a great love of children's books and their creators.

Other members of the Subcommittee worked with Storybox Library, Zart Art, Echelon, Merchandising Libraries and Spencil. During the year, the National Office collaborated with Erstwilder to produce a unique CBCA Book Week brooch based on the "Reading Is Magic" image. Partnerships is always looking for ways to engage partners and sponsors, as well encouraging interested members to join the subcommittee.

Justine Power and I represented the National Board at the refurbished Mint to launch the "Where Is the Green Sheep?" book and coin. There was a large cuddly toy green sheep, and the Mint CEO was dressed in a lime green suit. Judy Horacek was in attendance, and she drew sheep and read the book to a large group of excited pre-schoolers. You can imagine the fun. The close partnership with The Mint continues in the lead up to the production of the next book and coin set for 2025.

Justine Power and I also represented the National Board at the Canberra Teacher Librarian Professional Learning Community Conference in Canberra. We were able to have a display of 2024 Book Week merchandise, a "Reading is Magic" Photo frame for people to take pictures and lucky door prizes. The Branch Office was very helpful sending items to our Branch to facilitate this and we promoted CBCA to many Teacher Librarians.

All events surrounding the CBCA Book of the Year Awards process were once again announced online. This enabled the Notables, Short List and then the Winners to be transmitted to a huge audience in an entertaining and informative way. The results of the Shadow Judging by children were announced as part of the Book of the Year Awards for the first time and this added a new level of excitement to the ceremony. Congratulations must go to the team from the National Board that made this possible, along with the Awards coordinators

The National Chair, Wendy Rapee, stood down from her role in the middle of the year and NT Director Jonathan Howard stood in as interim Chair for the remainder of the Year. There were several other changes throughout the year at the Branch Office and Directors and Independent Board members. 


National Centre for Australian Children's Literature (NCACL)



NCACL celebrates 50 years of championing Australian children's stories

14 March 2024: The heart of a nation can be found in its stories – and for half a century, the <u>National Centre for Australian Children's Literature</u> (NCACL) at the University of Canberra has helped keep that heartbeat steady with its tireless work of celebrating, collecting and cataloguing Australian children's books.

Headed and run by NCACL Director Professor Emerita Belle Alderman AM and a dedicated staff of volunteers, the Centre has a collection of about 58,000 Australian children's books.

"About 6,000 of these have been translated into 79 languages, which we think beautifully illustrates the appeal and importance of Australian children's stories," said Professor Alderman.

"The Centre is also home to hundreds of original artworks, authors' and publishers' papers, ephemera – toys, boardgames and more – all built on children's books."

NCACL volunteers have also painstakingly compiled and curated several free-to-access databases: <u>Picture Books for Older Readers</u>, <u>NCACL Cultural Diversity Database</u>, and <u>NCACL Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Resource</u>.

Today, the Centre's collection is valued at \$12.8 million.

While the archives are open to all, University of Canberra students and staff enjoy particularly convenient access to the archives for research, and to gain valuable professional experience via Work Integrated Learning (WIL) and internships.



A Permanent

The Centre marked its 50-year milestone with a week-long celebration of workshops, a panel event, guided tours of the Centre's collection and a cocktail event gathering authors, partners and well-wishers, all focused in and around its home in The Hub, at the University's Bruce campus.

Delivering the welcome address at the anniversary event, the University of Canberra's Interim Vice-

Chancellor Professor Lucy Johnston acknowledged the long connection shared by the University and the Centre.

"It is only apt that I start from the beginning – in the form of a story," she said.

"In 1974, the Australian Government gave \$500 to each Branch of the Children's Book Council of Australia. Lu Rees, then-President of the ACT Branch, proposed that there should be a national collection of Australian children's books, and the ACT Branch began that collection, housed in their homes."

In 1979, the collection had outgrown these homes – and the then-Canberra College of Advanced Education (CCAE, which would become

the University of Canberra in 1990) stepped forward to provide a new home for the Centre.

"They knew the collection would be of interest to students in education, literary studies, cultural heritage, communication, public relations and languages," Professor Johnston said. "And so the collection of 1,000 books and 80 collections of material about its creators came to the then-CCAE." Renowned author and illustrator Bob Graham – whose relationship with the Centre spans his own



decades-long career – delivered a typically evocative welcome address, saying that the 50th anniversary had rendered him "a big brown bear standing in a stream, snatching at salmon ... swiping at memories".

"NCACL is an extraordinary resource of cultural importance to the arts in Australia and is run with such dedication and expertise by Belle and the volunteers," Mr Graham said. "Its archives hold my life laid

out in a bibliography – seeing such fundamental parts of the [book creation] process, it almost seems more 'real' than seeing the finished product has been."

As part of the celebrations, Christopher Cheng – award-winning

author, NCACL Ambassador and co-chair of the International Advisory Board for the Society of Children's Book Writers and Illustrators (SCBWI) – launched *Behind Secret, Sealed Doors*. Written by Emma Janssen, the book stars her daughters Sophie and Niome, as they explore all the magic NCACL has to offer.


The celebration event was filled with meaningful moments, community connections and opportunities for book-lovers.

Mr Graham and Rose Howes – who has volunteered for over 30 years at NCACL – were presented with awards for their service and collaboration; Dr Malcolm Beazley AM, Director and Founder of



the <u>Australian National Museum of Education</u> (ANME) also presented Professor Alderman a memento for the collection. And both Kingston-based independent bookstore The Book Cow and SCBWI members set up book tables for browsing and buying.

NCACL's Acting Chair Mr John Faulks captured the spirit of the occasion – and NCACL – in his address: "The thing that most distinguishes humans from machines is the imagination, and we are the tellers of things we imagine and things we observe ... knowledge locked away is knowledge lost. NCACL works to make it accessible to all."
